



Stand Together with Kids Fighting Cancer

Last year, 685 schools in Connecticut participated in PJ Day for the Kids by inviting students and staff to donate \$1, or more, to wear PJs all day in support of kids battling childhood cancer at Connecticut Children's. While all 169 towns in Connecticut were represented, not every school in every district participated. Together, we can reach 100% state-wide participation.



Get Inspired

As a 2nd grader, Nick decided to do something to help kids like his baby sister, Charlotte, who was diagnosed with cancer at 21 days old. "From a young age, I witnessed her and so many other kids enduring grueling treatments. My sister and these brave kids inspired me to do something to help," said Nick Wesoloskie. Thanks to Nick, his family and the community, PJ Day is now recognized by the State of Connecticut as an official day of awareness and is the largest fundraiser for the Center for Cancer & Blood Disorders at Connecticut Children's.



AN ACT DESIGNATING VARIOUS DAYS, WEEKS, MONTHS AND STATE SYMBOLS.

Section 1. Subsection (a) of section 10-29a of the general statutes is amended by adding subdivisions (72) to (82), inclusive, as follows (Effective upon the passage of a biennial budget for the biennium ending June

(NEW) (77) The Governor shall proclaim the second Friday in December of each year to be PJ Day to raise awareness of all of those children being treated and cared for in hospitals across the state. Suitable exercises may be held in the State Capitol and elsewhere as the Governor designates for the observation of the day.
